

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SPECIFIC NEED

For Africans, education is an essential key to freeing themselves from poverty. Deteriorated school buildings, inadequate supplies, limited teachers, and no transportation to and from schools are the norm. Recent statistics on primary education available shows that there are about 2,015 primary schools in Nigeria with no buildings of any type.

The obstacles the stand in the way of a quality education for African children are greater than can be imagined by those in the developed world. Nevertheless, children in West Africa have an extraordinary desire to learn and a remarkable ability to excel in a rigorous academic environment. Because parents and their children know that education is the hope for the future and for Nigeria's

future, they will go to extraordinary length to provide educations for their children. Many children travel long distances each day to attend classes that are held under a tree.

WHAT WE DO

The Adassa-Adumori Foundation supports educational opportunities in primary and secondary schools by repairing substandard school buildings, providing books and computers, school supplies, uniforms, and functioning libraries. The Foundation also supports adult programs that focus on literacy. Health education which includes a broad range of health issues. Leadership Development seminars train community leaders on entrepreneur opportunities to increase economic development.



Champion a Village is Adassa-Adumori Foundation's development program that seeks to improve the overall quality of life in targeted communities.

Tribal communities of West Africa face many obstacles, both internally and externally. Relief and development experts have learned that Western philanthropic organizations cannot successfully effect sustainable change by simply addressing a single issue. It has to have a holistic, multifaceted approach.

The Adassa-Adumori Foundation collaborates with a targeted rural community to identify areas of needs and support development in education, health, women, children and families, youth and community development sectors.
